CHAPTER 11

341st Fighter Squadron "The Black Jacks"

The first Thunderbolts to arrive in New Guinea did so on 14 July 1943. Comprising a mixed batch of twenty five 348th FG fighters, nearly half of the contingent was from the 341st FS which moved its headquarters to Durand 'drome, Port Moresby, about a week later. From there it commenced a series of familiarisation and C-47 escort operations to Wau, Nadzab and Marilinen alongside the group's other two squadrons. On 13 December 1943 all three of the 348th FG squadrons were ordered to move to Finschhafen. The 341st FS later took up station at Saidor on 27 March 1944, then Nadzab #3 briefly before it left the main New Guinea theatre for Wakde in Dutch New Guinea on 22 May 1944. Major David Campbell took the 341st FS to New Guinea and was replaced by Major John Moore on 15 November 1943.

On 11 October 1943, 341st FS operations officer (and soon to be squadron commander and promoted to major) Captain John Moore was among a quartet of P-47s led by 348th FG commander Lieutenant Colonel Neel Kearby which undertook the first Thunderbolt mission over the Japanese base of Wewak. A total of nine victories was distributed between the Thunderbolts for which Kearby was later awarded the Medal of Honor. In fact, the Thunderbolts shot down only two Ki-43-IIs, but these were both high-profile officers being Captain Koyama Shigeru, commander of the 68th *Sentai*'s first squadron, and Lieutenant Colonel Teranishi Tamiya, the commander of the 14th Fighter Brigade.

On 7 November the 341st FS and the 342nd FS encountered particularly fierce resistance from Ki-43-II *Hayabusa* in a fight which spread from Nadzab to Saidor. The 341st FS shot down four *Hayabusa* against no Thunderbolt losses: 13th *Sentai* pilots Lieutenant Sakata Koichi and Sergeant Major Suzuki Sozaku together with Sergeant Toda Shiro of the 248th *Sentai* and Sergeant Shimanto Kikuo of the 59th *Sentai*.

On 1 December 1943 the 341st FS, alongside 36th FS Thunderbolts, escorted 90th BG Liberators to Wewak at medium altitude. Approaching the target, they were met by about 20 Ki-61 *Hien* and 30 Ki-43-II *Hayabusa* from the 59th and 248th *Sentai* in separate formations. With then escorts flying higher than the Liberators, there was a communications misunderstanding as to the formation's sequence and timing over the target. As a result, the rearwards bombers were attacked in a series of proficient and determined climbing attacks and three Liberators were downed.

The 341st FS incurred its first loss occurred at Cooktown, Australia, during a delivery flight when a new P-47D-2 was destroyed during a ground collision on 18 July 1943. The squadron lost a total of nineteen Thunderbolts in New Guinea, of which four were combat-related. The other fifteen were due to various causes including mechanical failure, bad weather, and landing and take-off accidents. Four of these losses were accidents at Durand 'drome. Poor fortune followed the 341st FS when Lieutenant Samuel Galik was killed in a landing accident during the
